**a. Autism Research Awards: \$4,907,968**

NAAR conducted its eighth annual meeting of its distinguished Scientific Advisory Board in June 2004 and, based on the recommendations of its advisors, determined the recipients of the 2004 NAAR Autism Research Awards. The organization received over 224 proposals from scientists throughout the U.S., Canada and Europe. This fiscal year, NAAR awarded 25 new Autism Research Awards for an initial commitment of \$1,401,916 and committed an additional \$1,810,476 for the second year of 35 NAAR Autism Research Awards, awarded in fiscal year 2003. Also in fiscal 2004, NAAR awarded 11 Research Awards for an initial commitment of \$556,668 to the Autism Genome Project, which will map the human genome in the search for autism susceptibility genes. Funding for the second year of the 2004 NAAR Autism Research Awards, in the aggregate amount of \$1,332,950, is scheduled to be disbursed through June 30, 2006, subject to satisfactory progress and availability of funds.

**b. Autism Pre-&Post-Doctoral Fellowships: \$1,455,565**

In 2004, NAAR increased its funding to pre-and post-doctoral mentor-based awards, committing a total of \$907,000. \$547,000 of the total was to 14 new pre-and post-doctoral fellowship awards; and \$360,000 was allocated to the second year of fellowships awarded in 2003. Fellowship payments in the amount of \$547,000 are scheduled to be disbursed through June 30, 2006, subject to satisfactory progress and availability of funds. In 2004, \$200,000 was committed to the second year allocation of, a collaboration with the Canadian Institute of Neurosciences, Mental Health and Addiction to co-sponsor a pair of six-year interdisciplinary autism training programs known as the "Training Programs in Autism Research". Post June 30, 2004, \$600,000 remains to be disbursed for such autism training programs.

**c. Outreach and Awareness: \$462,006**

NAAR was engaged in a variety of public education and awareness activities on behalf of autism research. The twelfth & thirteenth issues of *NAARRATIVE*, NAAR's newsletter, were distributed at no cost to over 60,000 individuals in the U.S. and abroad as well as at conferences and symposia throughout the country. Key science feature articles from *NAARRATIVE* are also posted on NAAR's website, [www.naar.org](http://www.naar.org). During fiscal 2004, NAAR established a new e-newsletter mechanism that sent informative e-newsletters featuring educational information about NAAR funded research & NAAR's mission & programs at no cost to more than 18,000 people at least once a month. In fiscal 2004, NAAR produced and distributed its inaugural edition of *Trailblazers*, a national newsletter focusing on the Walk F.A.R. for NAAR program that includes information about NAAR-funded research and NAAR's mission and programs. This publication was sent to approximately 60,000 people at no charge.

NAAR's Director of Research and Programs, along with its Vice Chair-Scientific Affairs and other members of its Scientific Affairs Committee, presented at autism conferences attended by parents and professionals and distributed information on autism and autism research to family members, teachers, therapists and other professionals. Furthermore, in fiscal 2004 NAAR continued to sponsor and present its community based scientific Lecture Series at no cost to families, therapists and educators.

**d. Autism Tissue Program: \$402,779**

The Autism Tissue Program (ATP), the first national, parent-led effort to encourage and support post-mortem brain tissue donation, is a collaborative effort among NAAR, the Coalition for Autism Research and Education (ACRE) and the M.I.N.D. Institute at UC Davis. This fiscal year, the ATP expanded its efforts regarding the urgent need for brain tissue donation for medical research. As of June 30, 2004, over 9000 have registered to donate brain tissue and 70 brain donations had been received. Thirty-seven (37) autism research projects are now utilizing tissue specimens secured from the ATP. The ATP website, [www.memoriesofhope.org](http://www.memoriesofhope.org), continues to be updated with donor memorials and is a source of information for both families affected by autism and investigators seeking tissue specimens. Research progress is also reported on the site. In addition, the ATP designated \$37,032 towards a new component of the Autism Tissue Program that partners with Medical Examiner's Offices and ASA Chapters in four states to expand outreach efforts in those regions.

**e. Scientific Conferences and Meetings: \$113,751**

For the fifth successive year, NAAR sponsored a three-day meeting of autism genetics researchers from around the world who are collaborating in their data collection and analysis. NAAR also co-sponsored the 3rd annual International Meeting for Autism Researchers (IMFAR) this past year, an interdisciplinary conference for autism researchers. NAAR Scientific Affairs Committee members and staff also represented NAAR at key science conferences. NAAR sponsored a state-of-the-science/consortium planning meeting for autism infant sibling researchers in August of 2003. The meeting was co-organized by the National Institute of Child Health and Human Development (NICHD) and resulted in the development of research priorities for the field and the identification of consortium's first collaborative project.
