
## Assessing the needs of families and individuals with autism spectrum disorder during the COVID-19 pandemic








Concerns for people with autism and their families...

Autism Speaks works to...

Teaching their autistic child or family member to wear a mask and social distance	Increase access to and funding for personal protective equipment and develop resources for training people with autism to socially distance and wear masks.
Not receiving any distance learning supports from their school	Increase access to and funding for distance learning supports for children with autism learning virtually.
Basic needs like food and housing	Connect families to local food and housing resources and programs, including free and reduced-price lunch programs during virtual learning.
Worry that someone in their family would contract COVID	Support public health guidance and resources around preventing the spread of COVID-19, testing guidance and increased risks for people with autism.
